... a key measure for monitoring macroeconomic activity, output, productivity, demand for jobs


GDP is not

Often at variance with people's personal experience






Example: income inequality










Money is not all that counts

- Last year: launch of the *OECD Better Life Initiative*
- Main goal: to build a GPS of societal progress, i.e. information system that

 - -Goes beyond the average
 - —Goes beyond "here and now"






A few highlights from HOW'S LIFE?

Strengths and weaknesses differ among countries





Low-income people report lower health status








Environmental sustainability



OECD research on well-being

- OECD committed to deliver on measurement agenda
 - Developing guidelines on subjective well-being
 - Integrating inequalities in National Accounts
 - Developing standards for measuring household wealth and joint distribution of income, consumption and wealth
 - Measures of household non-market production
 - Green Growth Indicators; Human and social capital
- In collaboration with National Statistical Offices and other international organisations



What next? (2)

Linking measures of well-being to policy-making

- Beyond the mandate of statisticians
- Involving other policy groups at the OECD
- Requires new analytical approaches
- Some countries have also started bringing considerations of well-being systematically into policy-making (Australia, New Zealand, U.K.)
- OECD stands ready to advance the agenda
